

“Power in the Name”
ACTS 3:1-26 NKJV

SYNOPSIS

In Jesus, we find everything we need, and can understand our eternal purpose in His Kingdom. Continuing in our verse-by-verse study through the book of Acts called “The Speedway”, Pastor Tim teaches a message from Chapter 3 entitled “Power in the Name” that includes 5 takeaways from God’s Word that we can apply in our lives.

Jesus...

- 1) Transforms people’s lives
- 2) Name should be lifted high & spoken of often
- 3) Fulfills all prophecy and puts an end to sin
- 4) Should be taken seriously
- 5) Will continue His ministry to the Jews, even after the Church is raptured

We hope this message encourages you to put all of your trust in Jesus, and experience the true power in His name and His Spirit who lives in all who put their faith in Him.

“THE SPEEDWAY: FUEL UP”

KEY VERSE

“But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth.”

ACTS 1:8 NKJV

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1) Text: Acts 3:25–26

Cross-References: Genesis 12:1–3; Romans 11:25–29; Daniel 9:24–27

Discuss: How does God’s covenant with Abraham in Genesis 12 guarantee a future blessing for Israel? According to Romans 11:25–29, why can God’s promises to Israel never be revoked — and how does this reassure Christians about God’s promises to us? How does Daniel 9:24–27 explain the future restoration and completion of God’s plan for Israel that Peter alludes to in Acts 3?

2) Text: Acts 3:11–16

Cross-References: Philippians 2:9–11; Colossians 3:17; John 14:13–14

Discuss: How does Philippians 2:9–11 explain why the name of Jesus carries authority, power, and universal honor?

3) Text: Acts 3:22–23

Cross-References: John 14:6; Hebrews 3:1–6; 2 Thessalonians 1:7–9

Discuss: How does Moses’ prophecy about “a Prophet like me” point to Jesus’ unmatched authority (Heb. 3:1–6)? According to 2 Thessalonians 1:7–9, what is the consequence for those who refuse to listen to Jesus, and how does that amplify the urgency of Peter’s warning?

FAMILY DISCUSSION *(Questions for your middle-school or high-school children)*

Text: Acts 3:22–23

Cross-References: John 14:6; Acts 4:12; 1 Timothy 2:5

Discuss: Moses warned that anyone who refuses to listen to the coming Prophet (Jesus) faces judgment. How does John 14:6 confront the idea that “everyone finds their own truth”? What does Acts 4:12 say about the exclusivity of salvation? And how does 1 Timothy 2:5 explain Jesus as the only mediator between God and people? Why does this matter for students surrounded by multiple worldviews?

REFLECTIONS

- 1) Think of an area where you keep asking God to “improve things” rather than change you: attitude, anger, purity, laziness, bitterness, fear, or insecurity. Pray for a changed heart and Christ-like heart.
- 2) This week, choose one private decision to honor Jesus when no one will notice: what you watch, how you respond to temptation, integrity in school or work
- 3) Choose one person who does not know Jesus and commit to praying for them and their salvation. Pray for an opportunity to share the gospel with them
